## CENTENNIAL

## FIFTEEN YEARS YOUNG

In the mid-1990s, Salisbury School began planning a vast building program designed to remake the face of the campus. Several overlapping phases included construction of new dormitory [Ward], reconstruction of the hockey rink and building a large field house [Flood Athletic Center], laying out athletic fields on the north side of Route 44, building numerous faculty dwellings, erecting a modern mathematics and science center [Wachmeister], and raising a new humanities and library building [Centennial]. Centennial was designed to house the History, English, and Foreign Language Departments, the Learning Center, meeting spaces, and the first purposebuilt library in the school's history.

Work on the new humanities structure required razing two earlier classroom buildings, Memorial [1950] and Harris [1978], and relocating the tennis courts away from the site they had occupied for nearly 100 years. Demolition began in 2000 and construction commenced soon thereafter. A huge celebration marking completion of the enormous structure occurred in the early fall of 2001.

This collection of photographs documenting construction is arranged in a chronological, "scrapbook." Many now associated with the school were not present to watch the process unfold. Others may have forgotten what a huge undertaking it was.
